- a) Delivered course2 from 20th to 22nd August 2024 in Nairobi, Kenya. The 3-day course
- Taught skills in "communicating citizen science data for management and advocacy".
- Trained 21 (9 female, 12 male) from 16 institutions. Fulfilling project indicator 2.1, the trainees included 8 decision makers (against a target of 8) from 6 government agencies (against a target of 8) and the Nigerian Conservation Foundation (conservation organisation), and 16 leaders of active citizen science projects: 13 on birds; 2 on pollinators and 1 on mammals.

All participants (100%) said their "abilities" to communicate citizen science data to non experts increased as a result of the training, and that they are 'extremely likely' (95%), or 'likely' (5%) to apply the skills and knowledge gained in their work

- b) Launched the Kenya Bird Trends (<u>www.kenyabirdtrends.co.ke</u>) on 23rd August 2024, at the Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS) Headquarters, Nairobi. 76 delegates (32Female; 44male), including Dr Erustus Kanga (KWS Director General, and Chief Guest) representing c.30 institutions joined the launch [aligned to indicators 0.3; 3.1 and 3.2]
- Dr Kanga hailed the Kenya Bird Trends as "a significant milestone in the ongoing efforts to conserve the rich avifauna of Kenya", and "a model for conservation across Africa."
- A major output of the launch was that KWS, National Museums of Kenya and the Wildlife Research and Training Institution (3 leading government conservation and research agencies), recognised the platform's role in making bird citizen science data accessed for use in guiding conservation decisions. [strengthening realisation of indicators 4.1 & 4.2]
- A scientific paper submitted around the platform has been accepted for publication in the 'Diversity and Distributions' journal. The paper involves Kenyan co-authors, increasing Kenyan ownership and uptake of the work. [linked to project indicator 1.4]
- c) In line with project indicator 1.4, at least 5 new species trends analyses (not reported in past report), were completed and submitted to international journals. 1 paper has been accepted, and 4 are under review.

Gen Z protests in Kenya slowed planning for course2. Also, a target Kenyan participant was denied travel permission by his US university due to security concerns. Luckily, the protests died ahead of the course date causing minimal impact on timing of planned activities and their set budget.

We acknowledge this comment. As outlined in our proposal, the project supports four global conventions (CBD, CMS, UNFCCC, and the SDGs) and two national strategies (NBSAP and NCCRS)

By the reporting date, we lacked enough results to showcase engagement. However, we initiated discussions with lead government agencies under the Ministry of Environment and Forestry, involved in NBSAP implementation:

- National Environment Management Authority (NEMA): Project leader held in person meeting with Dr Charles Lange, Deputy Director, Environmental Planning and Research Coordination, during the project inception.
- Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS). Email exchanges followed by (in project year 2) a meeting with the KWS Director General.
- National Museums of Kenya. Indirectly involvement through its Ornithology Section. The section hosts the Kenya Bird Map and by default the Kenya Bird Trends platform – a key project outcome.
- Wildlife Research and Training Institute email communication in year 2

Regarding NCCRS, an email to the Climate Change Adaptation department went unanswered.

Further, we engaged the above agencies – plus the Directorate of Climate change, Turkana County Government – in an online survey. Their feedback is in our Year1 report (Annex 11).
