Output 1: All activities were completed last year				
Output 2: Our original target for supply of the Human Elephant Conflict toolkit to Namibian Conservancies as to provide these to 7 conservancies. As reported in our annual report, by end of year 1 we had provided 10 toolkits to 9 conservancies. In the last 6 months IRDNC have extended toolkit provision to 4 more conservancies. Training has also been rolled out to these conservancies not just on deployment of the tools but also on elephant behaviour – following the training provided to the IRDNC rangers by Honeyguide at the start of the project. This took place at IRDNCs conservancy planning meeting which occurred in July.				
Output 3: Honeyguide have continued to experiment and innovate with new tools and have developed a further elephant deterrent – the ball. Another training video has been produced to document the construction and use of the ball. IIED have worked with Honeyguide to compile the training videos into an online toolkit which is available here: https://www.iied.org/honeyguide-human-elephant-conflict-toolkit . Over the final months of the project we will add a training manual to this toolkit too.				
The remaining period of the project will focus on adding resources to the online toolkit and disseminating this widely in Africa and beyond. This will occur through each of the partners networks focussing on community conservation networks and human wildlife conflict networks, including the IUCN HWC Specialist Group.

The review of our annual report suggested we ought to discuss with BCF Admin the risk to rangers dealing with elephants and to check whether we are sufficiently "covered". We are slightly confused by this request since no where in the activities do we suggest that any of the partners is potentially liable for ranger health and safety. The rangers are not employees of any of the partner organisations and they are already dealing with elephants – and running the risk of doing so – with or without this project. This project is intended simply to provide additional capabilities to deal with elephants – through access to tools. No rangers are compelled to use the tools and the project and project partners have no authority over the rangers. We would be ken to understand what actions BCF Admin would suggest we take.
