Project summary: In this study, we experimentally test interventions that make job markets more inclusive and improve access to off-farm jobs for farmers most negatively affected by conservation efforts in North Kivu. In a randomised control trial (RCT), we test whether offering young farmers a subsidised three-month internship in microenterprises in nearby cities can induce them to migrate and take up non-agricultural work. We compare the effects of this policy incentive to a short-term daily work scheme, which does not require farmers to move away from their villages. A third group of farmers receive nothing in the study. We also cross-randomise a short environmental education session across all three arms. We measure whether these incentives increase non-agricultural employment and reduce demand for agricultural land, thereby protecting natural habitats and biodiversity.

Progress updates: The RCT has been implemented in two phases to account for changes in security conditions in the eastern DRC. The first phase commenced in April 2023 with 300 participants and the interventions took place between July and November 2023, followed by the midline in December 2023. The endline survey was successfully completed in May and June 2024, with a 94% response rate.

The second phase commenced in March 2024 with 1024 participants in a different region of the park. The interventions took place between April and September 2024. 62% assigned to the internship group participated in the programme and 45% participated in the daily work programme. The midline survey commenced in early October 2024 and will conclude by mid-

Lower participation rates in the daily work intervention: Participation was lower than expected in the daily work intervention in phase 2, with participants citing security concerns as one of the main reasons for not participating. The rollout of this particular intervention was also delayed as our implementation partner (Virunga National Park) did not have daily work needs until the second half of the year.			
Our primary research question seeks to measure the impact of offering an internship programme relative to the status quo of receiving nothing or this daily work intervention. The lower intensity of treatment in the latter treatment arm means that we will have less statistical power to measure the effect of this intervention relative to the other interventions or control group. Nevertheless, this will not undermine our ability to measure the impact of the internship programme relative to the control group, nor our budget or timelines.
